Adam and Eve




So God expelled them from the Garden of Eden and sent them to work the ground, the same dirt out of which they had been made.


As the Bible shows, migration has been around for a long time.

Joseph's Brothers




"I have heard that there is food in Egypt. Go down there and buy some so that we can survive and not starve to death". Genesis 42; 1-2

What WRBF does


WRBF works to help refugees displaced by war into Europe.

We engage in Dundee and elsewhere.

Our main approach is to mobilise the time and talents of people in the churches and wider community in Broughty Ferry by finding opportunities for volunteering.

For example, the 200-plus refugees who have been relocated to Dundee by the Government need help with improving their English and integrating into Scottish society

Naomi and Ruth




One day she got herself together, she and her two daughters-in-law, to leave the country of Moab and set out for home; she had heard that God had been pleased to visit his people and give them food.
